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HYPOTHESIS

The husbandry practices and welfare concerns of IHDH are related to the

- 1) farmer experience
- 2) type of farming

- Intensive

- Semi-intensive
- Extensive



AIMS

Investigate IHDH management practices and welfare issues and find possible associations between them.

THE SURVEY: APPROACH

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Cross-sectional

survey

40 multiple-choice;

6 open-ended

question



Conducted from November 2023

By telephone from the deputy director of «Associazione Nazionale Allevatori IHDH» (ANACAITPR)





Consent was asked to the respondents before taking their answers

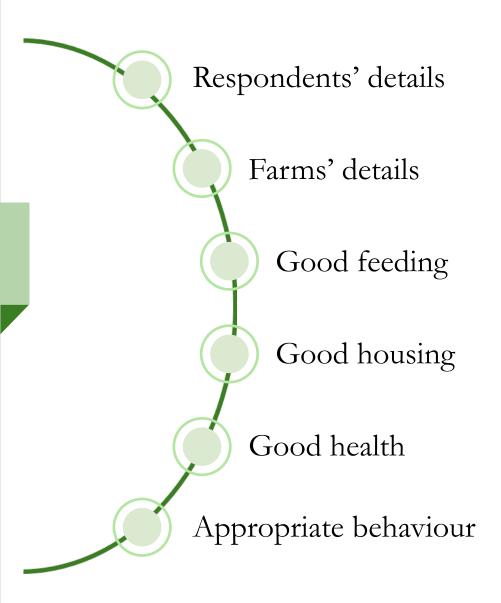

With farmer experience (<20 years; >20 years) and type of farming (intensive; semi-intensive; extensive)

Respondents' details

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FUTURE PERSPECTIVE 92 breeders were interviewed, reaching a representative sample of the IHDH farmers population

- The respondents were mainly middle-age males
- Most of them had more than 20 years of experience in rearing horses
- They learnt the profession mainly from their families
- They **personally** took care of the animals
- The concept of welfare was almost completely identified as **«good health»**
- Only for 8.9% of respondents animal welfare included >1 welfare principle

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Good feeding and good housing

- Most farmers watered (98.9%) and fed (85.9%) their animals ad libitum
- Almost half of the respondents reported that horses had access to **pasture** (41.3%), especially in **extensive** systems (Fisher's Exact Test p-value <0.001)
- Half respondents reported leaving salt blocks available (47.8%)

Good health

- **Deworming** was performed more fequently in **intensive farming** (Fisher's Exact Test p-value < 0.001)
- Hoof care and dental care was done when needed but not scheduled
- Hot branding was performed by 85% of respondents

BACKGROUND

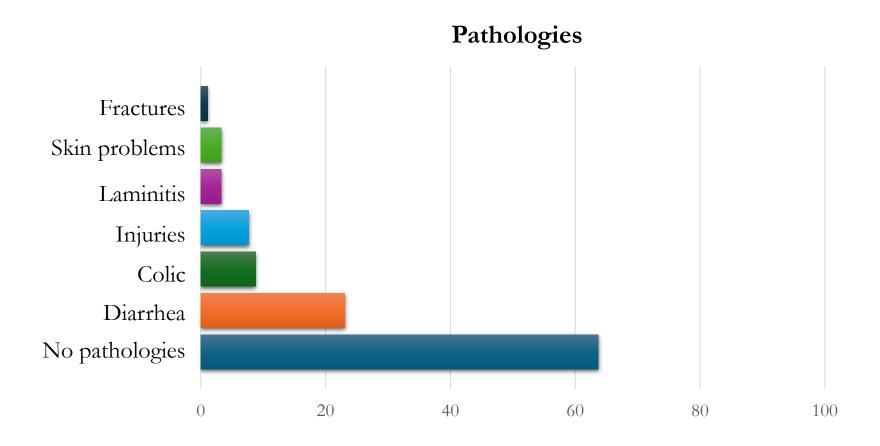
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Appropriate behaviour

- Horses were reported not to show stereotypies or aggression
- One third of the respondents reported that their horses were **not trained** to the use of the **halter** and to **be handled**
- Halter training was **less frequently** reported in horses kept in **extensive systems** (Fisher's Exact Test p-value < 0.001)
- Almost the totality of respondents did not train horses for transport (94.6%)

It is important to promote taming as most IHDH are handled and transported for various reasons (e.g., shows, breeding, slaughterhouse)

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TAKE HOME MESSAGE

- We obtained preliminary information on how IHDH is reared
- Some **good practices** were highlighted (e.g., group housing, feeding and watering ad libitum)
- But there were also some **welfare issues** and practices that need to be
 improved (e.g., no scheduled health
 care, hot branding, training)

First step to ensure a higher level of welfare for this Italian breed
